# Curricular Developments.

The Old School Henstead is driven by our determination to provide our pupils with a tailor-made learning experience of the highest standard. Our curriculum is designed to inspire and challenge all pupils, with teaching adapted to meet the varying needs and interests of our pupils.

The focus of the Curriculum Developments meetings this week was to outline our efforts in ensuring that our children receive nothing short of an exceptional learning experience. The developments that were discussed included: significant improvements in terms of both support and extension through the introduction of the Vertical Maths programme; the development of a more broad and immersive Humanities package; access to a wider range of opportunities to develop essential computing skills; the incorporation of a classroom



library system to ensure the pupils take a more active approach to reading; the incorporation of gymnastics sessions for all pupils from Reception upwards and greater provision for academic enrichment through the development of an ultra-curricular programme.

Our curriculum aims to ensure that children leave The Old School Henstead with not only the necessary skills and knowledge to succeed, but also with a love of learning.

# Ship Ahoy! Year Two Explores Maritime History













It was back to the early 1900's this week for Year Two, learning all about the herring fishing industry which helped to put the "great" into Great Yarmouth back in its heyday.

First stop was a guided tour around the *Lydia Eva*, a steam drifter, built in the 1930's, towards the end of the herring era. In class this week, we found out that Skye's great, great Granddad was the skipper, so it was wonderful for the children to retrace his footsteps on deck, in the galley, in the engine room, the coal bunker, the wheel room and the bunk house (most definitely the highlight). The children were climbing up and down the thinnest, steepest of ladders, peeping through port holes and learning all about the "silver darlings" in terms of how to catch them, store them on board and then sell them on shore in the bustling docks of Yarmouth.

It was a beautiful day, so we had our lunch on the beach. With a quick paddle, a hunt for seaside safety signs (that's next week's topic!) and an ice-cream stop in the sunshine, we then headed to the *Time and Tide Museum*. The museum is an old smoke house, so the children saw exactly what happened to the raw fish, to preserve them and turn them into 'bloaters' and 'kippers'. The smell of the fish and smoke is still strong after all these years, and the children were fascinated at the rows upon rows of herrings, and how high the workers had to climb to attach the herrings on the poles.
