Every week we enjoy a variety of phonics activities. Each activity has a different objective for the children to achieve in order to prepare them for the explicit "Letters and Sounds" work that they will be doing next year in Reception.

Throughout the year we concentrate on segmenting words (hearing syllables), hearing and identifying rhyming words, alliteration, linking initial sounds to letters, identifying initial sounds, learning the alphabet and developing our listening skills by identifying sounds in the environment and making sounds ourselves with instruments, everyday objects and our bodies.

Some of our favourite activities this week were "Silly Soup", "Cross The River", "I Spy", playing the bongo drums and "Smelly Socks".
