# 'Whizz Bang!' Chemistry & **Physics Experiments**



Year 6 delivered a series of experiments for our junior pupils:

Stacking liquids (densities)

Geyser Explosions (chemical reaction between cola and mints)

Eddy Currents (created using copper tubes and neodymium magnets)

Conservation of momentum (the effect of bouncing two differently sized balls simultaneously)

Gravity (keeping objects in the air using a

Hot Air Balloon (using heat to expand gases).
















# Science Week Round-up - Part 2

# Web Design

Our very own governor Mr Jones led an interactive workshop on web design for our Year Six pupils. I'm sure this knowledge will prove useful for them in their further education and work lives.



Kindly arranged by our governor Ms Tozer, Year 5 pupils were given special access to the stunning Lego Education Innovation Studio at East Point Academy, where students guided them through some more complex Lego designs, machines and remote-control devices.



Our study on healthy living centred on three activities: studying the effect of exercise on heart rates and breathing; healthy sandwich making; and designing hygiene posters! We hope to raise a more healthy pupil population.

#### **Creating & Testing Rigid** Structures

Year 3 created rigid structures based on strong triangles in Art & Technology this week, and tested their strength. Perhaps we have some future engineers in the making?


The children enhanced their learning of the 'Romans in Britain' by meeting even more characters from the era. Pro-Boudica Iceni tribe members taught them everything about life in their Roundhouse villages, from the food they ate, to the fabric they made and wore and the daily work they did. The Iceni women also showed the children how they worshiped their Gods and to make amazing Iceni necklaces called Torcs. The children saw the blue Woad dye face paint they wore to fight the Romans in battle and now understand why the Iceni people hated the Romans so much - how could they like anyone that stole their land, stole their jewels and forced them to pay taxes?





Marcus the Roman tax collector opened up an interesting debate about how Roman taxes benefited everyone in Britain, by building new roads and new towns for trade, by bringing in fresh water via aqueducts and education in their desire for civilization. The children also held lots of Roman artefacts - some of them were over 2000 years old - and they now know how to look for tell-tale signs if something is a replica or the real deal!

## **Today at the Zoo - A Presentation by the Zoo Keepers.**




