# Victorian Experience.











In the words of Mrs Scoggins on Tuesday: "Children, you look as if the Magic Key is glowing and you've been sucked through the doll's house into a Victorian Adventure with Biff and Chip"...and what an adventure it was! It started the moment the children arrived at school in their fantastic costumes (thank you parents and grandparents).

However, there was no Biff or Chip to accompany us, but a washerwoman called Rosie, the tenant of Cherry Tree Cottage called Katie and a (very scary) School Master called Mr Bradfield.

On arrival in Gressenhall Farm & Workhouse, the children were soon put to work in the Workhouse with Rosie. As well as helping her in the Laundry to wash the bedding and clothing for over 400 inmates (with very stinky carbolic soap and a washing dolly) the children were sweeping floors, dusting and polishing cutlery. They even helped her set the very grand table for the Workhouse Master and his wife's dinner, using an array of cutlery, bowls, plates and side plates. The children were also shown the punishment cell for naughty children and adults!

After lunch we headed to Cherry Tree Cottage, which was home to

six married couples during Victorian times. There, we made drop scones with Katie on her coal-powered range, and set about trying to find how the inhabitants entertained themselves without TV or an x-box and where they went to the loo! A bed pan/chamber pot/"goesunder" and an outside privy later, all became clear.

The day ended with a lesson in the School House with Mr Bradfield. First the children were invited to look, touch and compare with their current classroom, and then a very strict lesson of rote learning for times tables and the alphabet followed. Isabelle N was rigged up in finger stocks, used to stop children fidgeting, and Kitty modelled the back straightener used to stop children slouching. time hits when one is sitting in that exam hall, looking down at the paper in front asking oneself, "now what?"



#### **SWIMMING**

Our swimming team travelled to Ipswich last week for the Independent Schools Association (ISA) regional competition.

Whenever the yearly ISA regional swimming gala comes around, it is a great opportunity for the children to race against other ISA schools to try to reach the National swimming gala which, once again, will be held at the Olympic pool in Stratford.

After arriving earlier than any of the other 18 schools and having to deal with a delay of some 40 minutes before the start, the Henstead pupils were ready to race and they didn't disappoint.

Leading us off were the Under 9s who produced some excellent individual performances, with many of our swimmers finishing in the top five and the boys finishing in 1st place overall in their age category.

This set the tone for the morning - the Under 10s followed suit with more strong finishes from both the boys and the girls. The Under 11 races were the highlight of the day, with George Taylor winning his 50m breaststroke event. So, for the third year running, he will be off to the National Final at the London Aquatics Centre at the Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park in London on 23 January.

This week we received the detailed results, which we are pleased to report opposite. This was as much a team event as an individual one. Out of 18 schools entered, Henstead managed a fantastic sixth place overall.

A super day was had by all with the children really showing what an asset to the school they really are - made even more special by the amount of support shown on the day by The Old School Henstead parents.
