Inuits & The Cold Lands,







The Life of the Inuit

Reception pupils continue their topic on the Cold Lands and this week have looked at the Inuit community and their way of life.

A member of the Inuit people is called an Inuk. The children painted an Inuk and later added furs and stitching to show how they keep warm in the extreme weather conditions.

The Inuit main source of food is meat and they hunt for their food during the day. The children really had to think carefully when asked "Why can't the Inuit shop at Tesco or head to McDonald's for a treat?" The Arctic is too cold for farming and there are almost no trees or plants that can survive in the severe climate. In the short summer, they gather berries, seaweed and eggs. Caribou provide food and warm fur to make clothes.

Inuit also built Inukshuk (piles of stones) to mark areas and stop them from getting lost. The Inukshuk are sacred to the Inuit.

Fantastic work from all the Reception children. If you get a chance to visit our Cold Land in the classroom, you are very welcome, but please wrap up warm!

Let's go Orwell!



SWIMMING

Last Saturday George Taylor participated in the Independent Schools Association National Swimming Championships that were held at the impressive London Aquatics Centre at the Olympic Park in Stratford. Having qualified in the regional finals - for the third year running - George represented East Anglia in the 50 metre breaststroke final. Facing very strong competition he swam his fastest ever, achieving a personal best and narrowly missing out on a medal by less than half a second to finish in 4th place. George also competed in the Year 6 medley relay swimming 50m breaststroke, but unfortunately team East Anglia narrowly missed 3rd place. Under 9 Footballers stay resilient in challenging conditions

On two occasions we found ourselves a goal in front (delivered by Louis and George) but both times we were pegged back with the final score 2-2. The final game against Friends School left the fight for second league position still wide open, with many of the teams not wanting to find themselves in that position with a more difficult semi final in prospect. A 3-1 loss in the final group game saw us finish bottom of the group but still happy with our semi final opponents - this game had everything goals, woodwork hit, goal line blocks (by own players) great saves end to end action, but still managed to finish I-I. Penalties are always a lottery and so it proved, as the shoot out headed into sudden death, Henstead found themselves coming out the losing side.
