"The donkey wanted to lay down and go to sleep really."


"Baby Jesus is in his cot, Joseph is looking after the sheep and Mary looks after the lamb and the donkey."

Everyone in Year Three now has a Bronze certificate for five A Ls!


We have also been rehearsing hard for the Junior School Nativity and reading a Roald Dahl story in class.


