Our eager School Council representatives held their inaugural public meeting during last Saturday's Open Morning. With standing room only, parents, relatives and visitors encircled the 'Knights of the Round Table' and the business of the day began. The representatives demonstrated that they have a clear understanding of democracy, the need for respect and procedure. Discussion was intense, thoughtful and productive.

The meeting opened with a review of the proposals submitted to Mr McKinney following the previous weekly School Council meeting.

A number of new proposals were introduced for discussion - from the introduction of Class Supervisors to the purchase of a metal slide for the Mound!

The full minutes were approved and signed by George Taylor (Head of School Council) and Mr McKinney (Headmaster).

Miss Clifton explained that in order for the implementation of any proposals the School Council would have to be very clear about their intentions and these would need to be approved by Mr McKinney.

For several of the suggestions Mr McKinney asked for more research to be done, or requested more details or further investigation about the costs of implementation. One of the older pupils will meet with Mr McKinney to provide further details about the proposal to introduce Class Supervisors.

The Suggestion Box provided a host of suggestions for the School Council to explore and develop. With time running short it was only possible to scratch the surface and the remainder have been held for discussion at future meetings.

We need to keep in mind that suggestions need to enhance the learning opportunities and personal development of pupils at school.

Finally, the School Council would like to thank all those who attended. We hope you enjoyed the experience and were impressed by the wonderful contribution your children make to the continued development of our wonderful school.

As a school we value our pupils' voice: their fresh approach and reflectiveness has led to the implementation of a number of new ideas within the school.All School Council members, both past and present, should be hugely proud of the contribution that they have made, making The Old School Henstead an even better place to be.

Mathematics Curriculum.







This year, alongside the expertise of Mr Tiley-Nunn, the mathematics teachers at The Old School Henstead have been teaching their subject using the school's newly designed and newly implemented numeracy curriculum. Regrettably, I cannot speak from the perspective of teachers who have been teaching mathematics at The Old School Henstead prior to September, but what I can do is make comparisons to the mathematics curriculum that I have taught in the past.

As you will no doubt have noticed in my previous Pedagogical Ponderings, I have a very high opinion of how we do things at The Old School Henstead. I truly believe that we have the best of what the world of teaching can offer, and the teaching of mathematics is no less an example. For a start, there is an enormous commitment to the learning of basic facts and times tables. There is absolutely no doubt that having a strong foundation in basic facts and times tables is crucial for success in mathematics. In the Upper School, a minimum of one period per week is dedicated to the learning of times tables, and this, I believe, highlights our dedication to a strong foundation.

The mathematics curriculum at The Old School Henstead is a rigorous and challenging one that covers a variety of different strands. The plans that we use to teach from can be adapted by teachers in order to fully accommodate each student and his/her particular needs. Rigour is necessary. Challenge is necessary. And from what I am experiencing, rigour and challenge are exactly what our new mathematics curriculum is delivering.

Over the following weeks, as we go through our second round of open classrooms, I invite you to take the chance to look through your child's book. See for yourself the excellent content that they are getting to grips with, and observe how this curriculum is helping to make our pupils confident and able to tackle mathematics successfully.

Finding a spark.

Everyone has strengths - things they are good at. Equally, we all have weaknesses too. Often, we reflect too much on our weaknesses and don't allow ourselves to celebrate our successes as fully as we perhaps should. Children are no different.

In school, our pupils are required to undertake academic pressures which push and extend their own limits. Naturally, as most adults find, children have limitations in certain subjects too.
