Nursery Star of the Week goes to to Robin, who has been a kind and caring friend and been looking after the new children. Well done Robin. Have a great weekend with Sparky!




Reception Roundup.
















Science Space.

The science programme at The Old School Henstead got off to a great start this year. Year 6 pupils have thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to use the Lego Mindstorms suite at East Point Academy. Here, they learned the basics of mechanical robotics, using computer programmed instructions to tell a robot to do something. While for most of us robotics seems like a futuristic educational development, it is becoming more and more popular as a means to teaching computer programming in schools. Indeed, we are told that many of the jobs that our children may take up in the future are roles that don't even exist at this point in time. This is yet another piece of evidence that The Old School Henstead is preparing its pupils for the future.

Year 5 have completed their first scientific unit on forces, with a particular focus on Sir Isaac Newton's Three Laws of Motion. The pupils experimented with different objects to test and see the laws of motion in action. This learning culminated in an end-of-unit presentation on the three laws, much of which comprised of very entertaining video clips by our budding scientists.

Year 4 have studied materials. In studying this, they looked at the properties of all different types of materials and how they can be used for different purposes. Ultimately, this unit will culminate in the pupils selecting the best materials for creating a sail boat that they will float on the pond in Southwold. Through the unit, they have also studied conductors and states of matter (solid, liquid, gas).

Year 3 have begun the first part of their integrated science-outdoor education learning. Both Mr Hunt and Mr Hunter have enjoyed the opportunities for making connections between two independent learning areas, in doing so allowing the pupils to see the relevance of what they are learning in the two subjects. The completed dens that the pupils made were of formidable design. Perhaps an overnight stay should be on the cards?

Year 2 have studied electricity. They learned all about how electricity gets into our homes, including the difference between mains and battery. Of course, a real focus has to be becoming aware of the dangers of electricity, and Year 2 are now fully aware of why it is so important to be careful around circuits.

Year I have discussed all the different ways that they use water, from taking baths to watering flowers and plants. Afterwards, the pupils looked at all of the different states that water comes in: ice, (liquid) water, steam. They timed how long the frozen creature took to melt and they estimated how long a kettle would take to boil.

Success at ISA Regional Swimming Gala

Our swimming team travelled to Ipswich for the Independent Schools Association (ISA) regional swimming qualifiers on Wednesday. It was a fantastic opportunity for our swimmers to aim for places to represent the Eastern region at the national final which will be held at the Olympic pool in London. There was much excitement as the team prepared for the different races.

First up was Joey and what a way to start, cruising through his 50m Breastroke to earn himself the first spot to race at the Olympic pool. He followed this up by earning himself another first place in his 50m Freestyle event. This set the tone for how well the Henstead pupils raced all day, with most gaining a top ten finish.

Louis managed to earn himself a heartbreaking second place in his Freestyle and a third in his Butterfly. Freddy managed a second place finish in his Backstroke event. Skye finished fourth in both Freestyle and Backstroke. Archie and George finished fourth and fifth in their races whilst

Matilda finished in an encouraging sixth in her Breastroke event. Daisy, Lily, Alex and Rachael all performed strongly in their races.

In the final races Tilly earned herself a spot at the nationals when she finished first in her 50m Freestyle event, as well as finishing fourth in her Butterfly.


Team relays also ended on a high, with the Year 4 girls finishing second and the Year 5 boys finishing third.
