## **Crucial Crew.**





#### Water Safety, E-Safety, Fire Safety, Electrical Safety,

#### Anti-Social Behaviour, Blind Spots, Bike Safety, First Aid and Loan Sharks

Year Six enjoyed a visit to the Waveney Crucial Crew event. The Crucial Crew is a national scheme aimed specifically at Year Six pupils.

Pupils were taught how to tackle personal dangers they face, providing them with personal safety messages. They were encouraged to take responsible effective action in dangerous situations. Scenarios sensitise them to emergency and/or dangerous situations and develop social awareness, care for the social environment and others. The awareness of the consequences of offending behaviour was also thoroughly explored.

The Crucial Crew event comprised theatre-style sets which allowed the pupils to experience emergency/danger in a controlled environment. The problems they were presented with were reflective of those they are likely to meet in everyday life. When unsure how to respond, they were advised and reassured of the most appropriate course of action.

A valuable and enjoyable morning was had by all.

### **Pedagogical Ponderings**

We approach this time of year again, when our senior pupils are beginning to feel the pressures of examination preparation. Preparing to sit exams is never an easy task, but it is a task that is healthy and useful, no matter your opinion on testing, thanks to the amount of information that gets processed through the mind. Neuroscientists in the last decade have examined the brain in more and more detail with the use of modern scanning technologies. They have begun to see interesting patterns and changes which offer proof that our brains can change to accommodate new areas of learning. This change is due to a process known as 'neuroplasticity,' meaning the brain's ability to reorganise itself by forming new neural connections throughout life.

While our senior pupils acquire and practise the skills required by examination completion, their brains are making new neural connections which help them to develop the ability to use the skill more effectively in years to come. This is all a part of our role as a preparatory school – to prepare our pupils for the challenges that await them in their senior schools and beyond.

To those who are tenaciously working towards their entrance exams, hold in there.

## Musical Notes.

On Tuesday we held a concert for children who have individual vocal and/or instrumental lessons. Once again the children impressed with their sense of occasion and their confidence and we enjoyed many delightful performances.

The concert opened with a small ensemble of young voices - Harry D, Harry S, Emily and George, assisted by Skye sang *Rudolph the Rednosed Reindeer* and *Winter Wonderland* with accuracy and tunefulness. Following this we enjoyed solo performances on a variety of instruments.

#### Pianists

I was impressed to note the progress that Thomas has made since we last heard him. His piece showed good co-ordination of the hands and an understanding of the structure of his piece. Daisy W has obviously also been working very hard as she moved through different hand positions to give us Grieg's *Morning*. Honor needed great concentration to achieve such good rhythmic accuracy in her duet with Mrs Clayton and Sophia concluded this group with a delicately played arrangement of *Annie's Song*.

#### Drums

Alex Lincoln was also able to demonstrate a developing maturity in his lively playing, Rosie, making her debut, gave us a thoroughly reliable and well co-ordinated rhythmic pattern. Although Darcey was understandably confused by the way the drums had been set up she showed admirable resilience by taking her seat at the end of the concert and playing with great gusto. We look forward to hearing her in the next concert.

#### Singers

I am always delighted to hear such unforced natural singing from every one of the singers.

Daisy continues to grow in stature as a singer with a lovely performance of *My Favourite Things*, Tilly achieved wonderful breath control in *Once upon a Dream*. Skye, Sophia and Tabatha are all achieving high standards of intonation and sensitivity and each one gave thoughtful performances of their individual songs. *Greensleeves* is not an easy song to sing but Emily's performance was both accurate and sensitive. Louis made a fine debut as a solo singer with a piece from *Joseph*. George also sang *Do-Re-Mi* tunefully and with confidence as a debutant performer.

#### Brass

Charles S, making his debut appearance as a trumpeter, was joined by Matthew H and Louis M in a confident performance of Elegy. Louis then gave us a rhythmic rendition of a traditional folk tune and Matthew played a suitably festive Sleigh Ride.

#### Guitar

Another debut performance from Francis, whose thoughtful and confident approach ensured a very accurate performance of a folk tune.

#### Clarinet

Beth has made great strides since September and produced a really lovely tone on her clarinet in We *Three Kings.* I hope this will encourage more children to try this instrument.

#### Ukelele

It was good to hear the growing confidence apparent in Joe's rhythmic playing of the folk tune *Merrily*.

#### Flute

A lovely solo performance of *Silent Night* by Olivia S-A demonstrated just how beautiful this instrument can sound.

The concert concluded with another group of singers getting us all in the Christmas spirit with *Saviour's Day* and finally we all joined in with *White Christmas* to round off a superb concert that amply illustrated the children's talent and consistent hard work. Many of these musicians are preparing for Trinity Guildhall examinations and we wish them every success.
