









Christmas Science Challenge.




Reception Roundup.

Pedagogical Ponderings

The importance of making mistakes.

No one is perfect and we can do our children a disservice by telling them that we are. Making mistakes is a crucial part of the learning cycle, and it's important, now more than ever, to help children understand this.

But why?

Life is full of ups and downs, and that is a reality of life that we all have to adjust to. How many times have you made plans that have fallen to pieces? Sometimes, there's nothing that can be done and you just have to bite the bullet, keep calm and, (in those famous words), carry on. It's a guarantee that these things happen at one stage or another, and mistakes, like failed plans, are a fact of life. We have to be ready for that, and making mistakes early helps us to learn this.

Making mistakes helps our minds to grow. Famously, Thomas Edison trialled hundreds, if not thousands of potential methods for perfecting the humble light bulb. Each mistake, however, was not something that caused a problem, it merely pointed out that that was one method for not creating a light bulb. Eventually, through the mistakes he made, his mind was pushed to continue his search, until he finally mastered the art of electric lighting.

Dr Carol Dweck of Stanford University has given us, in recent times, cause for thought around a new buzzword in education, 'mindset'. She discusses the two mindsets, fixed and growth, and the traits of each. Making mistakes and learning from these is definitely a positive trait of the growth mindset and Dweck explains that this should be encouraged in our youngsters.

More information on the fixed and growth mindset can be read in Dr Dweck's book titled simply Mindset.
