With teachers ten steps behind, they set to work locating a number of specific landmarks and completing a wide-ranging shopping list within a very limited budget. Busy streets, minimal city knowledge, a variety of social interaction and a maximum of $\pounds 2.00$ to spend on their lunch provided a fitting challenge. Few nerves and good teamwork enabled all the landmarks to be located, all the shopping successfully purchased.

A single day provided a huge learning opportunity and knowledge that will ease the growing distance between nurturing and taking sole responsibility for themselves and their actions.

Dinosaur Park (Year One Trip)

Year Six pupils joined this trip as leaders and joined three members of staff to take on a duty of care role for younger members of the school.

Not there to admire the prehistoric inhabitants, guidelines were clear. Their task required them to show leadership, to take responsibility for the Year One pupils and to support the staff.

Another chance for independent decision making and in some cases slightly out of comfort zone experiences. A successful day was had by all and the learning as the day progressed, evident to all.
