
# Egyptology.

# Reception Roundup.









Despite our week being cut short due to the snow last week, we are really impressed in Reception with the progress all the children are making as we head in to the second half of the year. They are listening attentively in a range of situations and are learning how to give their attention to what others say and respond appropriately.

Our weekly swimming, games and music lessons are supporting us on how to follow instructions involving several ideas, while the more academic subjects are helping us to ask 'how' and 'why' questions about our experiences.

The wonderful arrival of the snow last week has given us the perfect opportunity to show how we play co-operatively and take account of one another's ideas about how to organise activities. They are all really good now at showing sensitivity to others' needs and feelings.

We have been focusing our carpet time this week on reading and understanding simple sentences. We use our phonic knowledge to decode regular words and read them aloud.


In maths we have been looking at everyday language to talk about time. We used our cutting skills to make our own clocks and had to order numbers from 1 to 12. We have also been using 3d shapes to describe dinosaurs and 2d shapes to make dinosaur pictures.



## Nursery News.




