The sports element of the programme will include a tennis session with our tennis pro Ben Thompson and the Thursday group of players. We appreciate your help in spreading the word.


Outdoor Education Camp.

Reception Roundup.






Welcome back to the last and most exciting part of the year. The anticipation of summer shows, speech day and sports day are

CRICKET FESTIVAL & RIDDLESWORTH HALL

We began our cricketing day down at a sunny Denes Oval. It was pleasing to see the Henstead pupils taking it upon themselves to warm up for the morning matches.

A smaller format of 8 overs per innings meant for some big hitting. We found our first game tough against the eventual winners Albert Pye. Some slack fielding and with 5 dropped catches meant we faced an up hill battle when batting. Although runs were scored, we were unable to maintain the high run rate required and came up short by 30 runs.

Our second game saw us dominate Woods Loke from start to finish: some deadly bowling took the wickets and catches were taken, along with a couple of run outs. This was backed up emphatically by some long handle hitting from the whole team, giving us a sizeable margin of victory of 40 runs.

Next up Blundeston - this game followed in the same pattern as the first with strong bowling

restricting our opponents to just 28 runs. We were growing in confidence and scored a huge 55 runs

With time against us, a limited overs game was played against Elm Tree, with Captain Lark choosing his bowlers wisely. Our opponents ended on a negative score whilst we batted freely, leading to a comfortable victory.

A superb second placed finish overall and we hopped on the bus ready to head to Riddlesworth Hall.

On arrival at Riddlesworth we found ourselves put into bat first. Captain lack leading the way, backed up by Alex, some good calling and singles scored before Jack smashed a ball towards the boundary rope only to be caught just before it went for 6! Louis arrived in bat ready to go on the attack, however his innings was short lived and he soon followed Jack on the long walk. Steadying the ship were Alex and Harry. Scoring quick singles they managed to bat for a impressive 8 overs before retiring. Archie and Francis arrived at the crease and put on a performance. Both eager to run quick singles at any point

and some big hitting entertained the crowd, both finishing not out, Archie on 40 and Francis on 22. Daisy and Charlie came and went in quick succession due to some excellent fielding and Harvey was freakishly run out. That left us with Tom, who against batted confidently and helped us post 110/6 after 20 overs.

Jack and Daisy opened the bowling and found the first couple of overs against the older boys difficult. Nevertheless they quickly got down to business with Daisy keeping line and length to take a well-deserved wicket. Archie and Louis bowled with pace and accuracy, Louis ploughing through the batting order taking 3 for not many and Archie chipping in. Francis changed the tempo of the bowling with some excellent spin - working his magic, he claimed 2 wickets.

An excellent team effort kept our opponents down to 98/8 after 20 overs.


