Jeans for Genes.

During PSHEE Year Six had been studying difference and diversity. Each pupil identified themselves as being different and the class group as diverse. They shared their individual uniqueness with the whole school during a recent class assembly, appraising their individuality and celebrating difference.

Using the beautifully simplistic but powerful illustrations from Todd Parr's book "It's okay to be different" the message was clear — it's okay to wear glasses, it's okay to be a different colour, it's ok to have wheels. The understanding of difference, that no two people are alike and that it's okay to be who you are underlined the need for our children to learn to embrace the differences in the world around them and to be proud of themselves and their families.

There are around 6,000 known genetic disorders. It is estimated that I child in 25 in the UK is affected by a genetic disorder. 30,000 babies are newly diagnosed in the UK every year. Some disorders can be detected at birth whilst others are diagnosed at different stages throughout childhood and sometimes into adolescence.

Our fundraising Jeans for Genes afternoon allowed every member of our school community to wear their jeans to school. Donations helping to fund projects that provide nursing care, equipment, activity weekends, online support and counselling for those who most need our support.

Henstead children and staff of all ages clearly enjoyed the opportunity to mix and match school uniform with denim – a super way to bring relief and support to other children all over the UK.
