## Robotics & Programming.









Years 5 and 6 were very lucky to secure the chance to attend a BT Crumble Robot Taster at Adastral Park this week. The purpose of the visit was to take part in robotics and computer programming, a skill that is vastly growing in the 21st century. The challenges in which the pupils took part began with simply coding LED lights to turn on and off, as well as varying the colours and order in which the sparkles flashed. Each time a challenge was achieved, the progression of the task became more and more complex, requiring the children to turn their Crumblebot in a required direction at a required angle, and moving it forward to stop on a black line (when the sensors on the machine detected a change in colour). The final challenge of the day culminated in a competition against the other schools that were participating in the day's event. On a giant track, two Henstead teams led by Kate and Bonnie placed their bots on the racetrack and, on the command go, released them in a clockwise direction. The pupils had programmed the robots to follow a black line on the ground, and the winning robot came down to accuracy and speed. Marginally missing out, Kate's and Bonnie's team were very proud of their engineering. Special mention should go to Harvey, Thomas, lack and Immy who greatly impressed the hosts with their design grit and knowledge of programming tools. Special mention should also go to Mr Nigel Leech who helped the day's events get underway, and who accompanied us and shared his computer-based expertise.




## Musical Minibeasts.



Year One enjoyed an action-packed day on Thursday at the Britten-Pears Foundation located at the Red House Aldeburgh, the former home of Benjamin Britten. With a theme of musical minibeasts and illustrated by the music of Britten, the day combined science, history, literacy and music in a wide ranging series of activities. The day began by learning how to distinguish insects from other minibeasts, before venturing into the five acre gardens to search both woodland and grassland habitats for minibeasts. Woodlice, spiders, dragonflies, ants, centipedes and beetles were enthusiastically unearthed and investigated using magnifiers. Moving back inside we looked at some examples from the museum including Asian Hornet and Scarab beetles, before designing and building individual 'bug hotels' to take

The house is kept just as it was when Britten lived there with many personal artefacts (the camel bells that he used to play tricks on guests were a favourite!), a fine collection of paintings and the piano he played most days.



The museum proved to be another exciting, hands-on venue with headdresses to try on, searching for minibeasts that attack our homes, such as the carpet beetle, the biscuit beetle and the clothing moth, and colouring in masks to wear.

We returned to the education centre where Joe told us a story about an angry wasp and a grasshopper. Using an array of percussion instruments the children then selected and composed sounds to illustrate the story. After practising and refining their sounds we all returned to the library where the children gave a performance of their music to round off a wonderful day.






## Britten Challenges.







Today it was Year Three's turn to visit the Red House in Aldeburgh. Settling in the education room we began with some starter games centred around the orchestral families. A visit to the archive enabled us to see original photographic evidence of the catastrophic fire that destroyed Britten's beloved concert hall at Snape in 1969. We pondered possible causes of the fire and read of Britten's determination to rebuild it. We were then taken behind the scenes to a part of the building not open to the public and viewed the high levels of security for maintaining the precious manuscripts. This prepared us for one of the main tasks of the day - designing a new concert hall keeping within a budget of £100,000. Choices, choices.....luxury seats at £1000 each or budget seats for £200, one royal box or more and how big shall we make our stage?

In the museum we viewed the original scale models for the stage sets for three of Benjamin Britten's operas, Noyes Fludde, Peter Grimes and A Midsummer Night's Dream and were then set the task of making our own designs for an opera telling the story of Noah's Ark. Each design proved to be highly original with arks tossing on wild seas, animals peeping through port holes, tropical fish and even a shark. (Was it Hattie?)

On entering the Red House itself the children stepped back in time into a home that felt as if Britten had just stepped out for a moment. Year Three were especially impressed by the cork and gold leaf wallpaper in the sitting room. Here Britten entertained many guests, including the Queen as well as many famous musicians. He grew vegetables and even played croquet in the garden. Britten was also a very keen tennis player. Sadly the grass tennis court is no longer maintained but it proved to be an ideal playground for fun and games at lunchtime.

The short but varied concert in the library was a welcome moment of calm at the end of a hectic day. The professional harpist, Zoe, played music from Disney films, a piece by Ed Sheeran as well as lullabyes and a fanfare. The children especially enjoyed the opportunity to have a turn at playing the harp, although it proved rather a large instrument for some!




## Reception Roundup.

The largest Henstead team ever entered in the annual Gresham's Cross country headed north last Friday.
