Hungry for Knowledge.







The children have been as industrious and keen to learn as ever during this half-term. Our English text, I Was a Rat, is a tale loosely based on Cinderella. It is told from the point of view of one of the household rats who has been transformed into a page-boy, but who, for some mysterious reason, hasn't been turned back. The pupils have been working on their alliteration skills in preparation for writing a super sensationally searing newspaper report about this strange young boy who insists he was once a rodent.

We have also been developing our dictionary skills this half-term. The ability to navigate a dictionary is important as it develops understanding of the spellings and meanings of words, their etymology and the different contexts in which those words can be used. This then feeds into the children's reading and writing.

Maths has seen us challenging ourselves when learning about horizontal, vertical and perpendicular lines and acute, obtuse and right angles. The pupils have also been testing their mental maths dexterity as well as calculating the answers to column addition and subtraction questions, which start to get quite tricky once they have to exchange and regroup numbers — aka borrowing and carrying to those of us who attended primary school in the 70s and 80s! The boys and girls, not shy of solving tricky problems themselves, have been challenging me to answer some rather complicated number questions involving more than 10-digit figures!

In Drama we are looking at using body language to show feelings and moods. This can be enormously helpful when acting because as we know, sometimes actions speak much louder than words and can convey thoughts and emotions far more effectively. The children have proved to be excellent at this and we look forward to seeing the fruits of their labours in the Nativity next month.

Languages are an important part of the curriculum and in French, Year 3 has been using the Duolingo App on the school's new iPads once a week, combining grammar-based language learning with game-based vocabulary learning.

And lastly, the children have been honing their online research skills in science and this week they were all awarded A Is for gathering information about an animal which lives in their chosen ecosystem. It is a delight to watch these wouldbe future scientists excitedly sharing their discoveries with one another as they begin their journeys of exploration in the classroom, and enthusiastically embracing one of our school academic values for this half-term, which is to be a researcher.

Every week I marvel at this group of young people. Their positive attitude, hunger for knowledge, sense of humour and support for one another is a pleasure to witness and everyday brings new delights. Well done and thank you Year Three!

Bright Sparks in Science.









So far there have been many wonderful creations ranging from dream catchers, clay models, conker caterpillars, autumnal jars and hanging willow decorations.


