### Inter-House Drama Competition

Waveney's performance was of "The Chicken and the Golden Eggs", the tale of a poor farmer who, wishing for a more luxurious life, is granted by four elves a magical hen, which can lay eggs of solid gold. (Our hen laid a rugby ball covered in gold foil!) Initially the farmer and his wife become rich by selling his golden eggs to the townsfolk, but greed takes over, and rather than waiting for each individual egg to be laid, the farmer decides to cut the chicken open and take out the gold-mine he thinks must be inside! Unfortunately there is nothing inside and the dead chicken can no longer lay golden eggs. The farmer's life of luxury is over. Waveney's moral from their fable is that greed does not pay and we must learn to be content with what we have.

A strong musical lead from the art and music departments made an immediate impact (lucky Waveney). It was the dialogue delivered by the youngest performers that was a standout feature of this performance, together with the realistic clucking of the hen. Costumes were of a more modern feel and the moral was delivered strongly, much to the obvious discomfort of the hen.

Yare presented its take on 'the fable 'A Wolf in Sheep's Clothing' and we were treated to a pleasing scenario, supported by the effective use of percussion. Sheep there were a-plenty in this tale also, a very scary wolf and a very striking chorus to introduce the tale, aided by highly realistic voices from duped senior citizens to lupine ne'erdowells. The lines delivered by the younger members of the company were confident and this augurs well for the production to come later in the year.

Deben performed a version of 'The Boy Who Cried Wolf". The classic tale concerns a shepherd boy who repeatedly tricks nearby villagers into thinking a wolf is attacking his town's flock. When a wolf actually does appear and the boy again calls for help, the villagers believe that it is another false alarm and the sheep are eaten by the wolf

From it is derived the English idiom "to cry wolf", defined as "to give a false

alarm". This has been a wonderful team exercise for the Deben foxes. But the question on everyone's lips is, surely, will Deben recover last year's trophy and complete a drama competition hat trick? Confident fingers are crossed by Mrs Loader and Mrs Dakin.

Strong narration from the narrator and clear diction from the characters, together with some excellent unison recitation, clearly baaed by the sheep. Full use was made of the stage and the auditorium, with characters entering through the stalls and the flock stage right acting in the dramatic role of chorus. The repetition of the message reinforced the moral of the tale in what was a most effective rendition. A scary wolf completed the tableau as did a range of apt musical choices.

Orwell presented 'The man, the boy and the donkey, who travelled along, taking turns to ride the donkey as passers-by gave them advice. The visual impact of Said, the school pantomime camel, is always a crowd pleaser. Strong dialogue from the en route advisors and using the whole depth of the stage added impact to the piece. There was an especially strong performance from the narrator, drawing in the chorus of mockery given by the younger members. The moral of 'please all and you will please none in the end' was clearly portrayed.
