Cross Country Competition













Year Six English Learning Focus

This half-term, we have been reading Journey to the River Sea by Eva Ibbotson.

The boys and girls have been thoroughly absorbed and entertained by this story about an orphaned London schoolgirl, Maia. She is sent to live with her unpleasant relatives along the Amazon river. There she discovers an exotic world bursting with new experiences, and sets off on a colourful and exciting adventure.

Journey to the River Sea won the Smarties Book Prize Gold Award, was runner-up for the Whitbread Children's Book of the Year and the Guardian Fiction Award, and was also shortlisted for the Carnegie Medal.

Through this wonderful story, we have been able to create character profiles, make family trees for the characters, use powers of inference and deduction and answer comprehension questions, as well as enjoy lively discussions about the text and make predictions about what will happen next.

Reading is a powerful resource for taking thrilling and exotic journeys without even leaving our homes. This story will be the jumping off point for the pupils to do research projects about the Amazon river over the coming weeks, and to write their own stories of incredible adventures. I look forward to reading them!

pushed the boundaries to tackle three-digit by a single digit multiplication.
