Mathematical Arrays.











This week Year Two studied multiplication. During the week they worked on both the recall of times table facts, focussing on immediacy and accuracy, and the conceptual basis of multiplication through the visual representation in arrays. Through drawing and arranging their own with the help of Dienes cubes, and some excellent work on discovering the inherent relationship multiplication and division have (being inverses of one another,) the children developed their understanding well.

Afterwards, with a spot of fortunate weather, the children took to the school grounds to find arrays in the natural spaces. With some creative searching, we found arrays in most unlikely of places including the tennis court nets, the hall windows, gym mats and more.

As always, the children's willingness to actively participate in their own learning has allowed for some impressive learning and work to take place. Well done, Year Two.
