Discoveries in Science.



Year One has been enjoying investigating and problem solving. Our Science topic on magnets has been particularly thought-provoking. The children were given a jar of water with a paper clip stuck in the bottom. Their task was to get the paper clip out of the jar without getting wet hands! The children paired up and discussed their ideas. String was suggested as an aid to help, but didn't work. More brainstorming, then a magnet was the next idea. Before long one team had the brilliant idea of sliding the magnet up the outside of the jar, carefully attracting the paper clip up and out of the jar. Hooray!

The next task was to make a paper clip travel along a piece of paper using a magnet. This stumped some of the pairs as the magnet and paper clips were placed on top of the paper by the children. The paper clip didn't go anywhere except stick to the end of the magnet. A flash of inspiration from Edie, who suggested "why not just put the magnet under the paper." A cheer from a proud teacher and hugs from all the children for Edie, paper clips were then soon whizzing round.

What a Game!





A terrific start to the boys' football season, with a 8-1 away victory. On arrival the boys were able to see they would be playing on a small pitch but with big goals, meaning end-to-end play, plenty of chances to score and the need to be at their best defensively. They did not disappoint.

A bright start from the Henstead boys saw added pressure from IG and Sam, with IG stinging the hands of the home goalkeeper on numerous occasions. Defensively Luca and Adam were limiting Beccles to corners and crosses but no shots on goal. Bobby, who started in goal was showing some excellent distribution skills, setting up numerous counter attacks with his kicking but when required also playing out from the back. Attacking corners from Adam, Sam and IG were causing mayhem in the Beccles box and finally Sam was on hand to smash the ball home for a 1-0 lead. This didn't last long though as Beccles began to attack and after a sustained amount of pressure the ball found its way into the back of the Henstead net after a strike from the edge of the box. This was the spur Henstead needed and with Rafferty

dominating the midfield, we were pushing for a second goal - it came eventually through Raff himself, a wonder strike from out wide into the far top corner of the goal. Like buses another soon came along with IG finally getting himself onto the score sheet and a 3-1 lead at the half time break.

Henstead continued to dominate in the second half. IM. Football Tournament Success.





The final fixture of the half term was once again a success, the under 11 boys football team finishing runners up in the North Suffolk football tournament.

This saw us top the group and qualify for the semi-final.

The semi-final was over before it had begun, a scintillating opening five minutes saw us take a 3-0 lead - a wonderful dribbling run from IG, who laid it off to Sam to slot home, then IG once again driving forward, choosing to shoot himself to make it 2-0; finally, Rafferty's driving run and shot saved by the keeper fell to Sam who was in the right place at the right time to make it 3-0. Once again the subs kept up the level of hard work and continued to press for a fourth goal, however just before the final whistle Grove managed to get a consolation goal to finish the encounter at 3-1.
