They were most impressed by how precisely they were able to pinpoint different locations and are keen to continue their learning in the great outdoors.

Materials Science.









This half term, Year Two has been learning about materials during our Science afternoons. The children have been working scientifically to perform a range of investigations to explore the properties of materials further.

One week, the children investigated floating and sinking fruits and vegetables. They placed various groceries in a large tub of water after making predictions about which would sink or float based on their shape, size and what they were made from.

Another afternoon the children investigated absorbency of materials where sponges, cardboard, clothes and cotton wool were tested. The children used various measuring equipment to plan and perform their experiments.

They also conducted studies to find the most suitable material to build a bridge to support Mrs McCarthy's Deben fox called Mr Red. Teams made bridges from lego, paper and tape or spaghetti and marshmallows. Each bridge worked to varying success and we discussed and understood the reasons why.

The team work and resilience that all of the children have shown during these investigations has been excellent. - Mrs McCarthy



Literature and Sonic Studies.



Over the last fortnight, Year Four has made excellent progress across all of their subjects. Working in a variety of locations, their attitude towards learning and developing their understanding has been, as ever, exemplary.

In English, we have explored a range of fiction and non-fiction texts, including *Wolves in the Walls* and *Wolf Wilder*, and then analysed their meaning, implicit and explicit. The children are already at a level where they can detect meaning behind the words, seeking to understand authors and the nuances hidden beneath their phrasing. This was particularly evident when exploring a passage explaining the historical significance of wolves in Russia. The children were impressive in their abilities to grasp the notion of symbols and, in the case of this book, their roots in superstition.

In science, our study has been towards something far less metaphysical: sound. Observing how pitch and how it affects sound waves, we directed our focus to musical instruments. Using a variety of instruments, including drums, recorders, our own panpipes, we explored how the length of vibrations can change various metrics of sound. A fun (and noisy) lesson, the pupils consolidated their understanding well with a blend of theoretical and practical considerations. - Mr Hunt

To wrap up our learning about tigers we travelled to Banham Zoo. The tiger enclosure was an exciting place and we were fortunate to see the tiger cubs wrestling each other and playing with their parents. Joanna the zoo keeper told us all about the different types of tigers, what they eat, where they live and how they are endangered.

The children also enjoyed the ride on the small train around the zoo, stroking a snake and laughing at some very funny monkeys. It was a wonderful day together and the teachers were so proud of our perfectly behaved boys and girls. - Mrs Vorster
