

However, we looked at how using the fewest number of coins to buy toys in a shop is much easier than carrying and drawing around lots of 1p coins! We also explored different ways of making 10p, 20p and so on.





### Quests, Fractions and Sea Creatures!









Year Three has had a great week! We explored King Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table and started to plan our own quest that we might go on if we were to live in Camelot. So far we have quests that include defeating the evil sea queen and stealing back a giant diamond from a firebreathing dragon. The pupils will be writing their new quests next week with illustrations to accompany them.

In Maths the pupils have been working hard calculating ½'s, ¼'s and 1/3's of numbers and shapes. They have been calculating these using a variety of methods, the most popular using smarties/ skittles (for obvious reasons!).

Our topic this term has been focusing on life Under the Sea and this week the pupils expressed an interest in learning about turtles. They learnt that there are over 365 known species of turtles in the world. They focussed on the. loggerhead, green turtle, leatherback, hawksbill, Kemp's ridley, flatback, and Olive Ridley. They were particularly amazed by the fact that turtles can hold their breath for up to five hours!



# Seeds, Science and Medicine.









Year Five has been busy across all areas of the curriculum. This week we were looking at 'The parable of the sower' in our RE lessons. When the farmer was sowing his seeds, some of it fell on the path, some between rocks, some in thorny bushes and finally some fell on good soil. We learned that parables were told by Jesus to teach the people something about God. From this parable we learned that Jesus was teaching that some people want to follow God and some do not.

In science we have been looking at many different scientists. This week we learned about Alexander Fleming and his discovery that led to the invention of penicillin, a life changing medicine. We looked at some data about the effect of the mould on bacteria around it and put this data into a graph.

They demonstrated bacteria being killed by the penicillin disc in the middle of the dish. The pupils made a scattergraph to show the effects of penicillin on bacteria over a period of time. - Mrs Solomon
