Humanities - Framlingham Castle.









Year 4 and 5 pupils had a wonderful visit to Framlingham Castle this week. We were amazed to see how much of the castle still remains, including the curtain wall all the way around the castle and the towers (thirteen in all). The castle was originally built by the Bigod family (Roger Bigod 1) in 1101. Not long after this, Henry II became king, who then built some of his own castles (including Orford Castle) as the Bigods had five castles! The pupils loved the 'wall walk', where they could see far across Framlingham. We walked around the outside of the castle to see the moat and get an even better view of the arrow slits in the walls. The children were surprised to find out that the castle had been used as a prison for a while, as well as a workhouse. A great time was had by all! - Mrs Solomon


