Henstead Hike.





A fantastic effort from the whole school community today as we took on the 13-mile challenge of our coastal Henstead Hike. The weather was not always kind, but we won through. We were delighted to welcome many parents and canine friends too!

D-eye-section,





The pupils had long been looking forward to their science practical - dissecting a pig's eyeball. They had discovered that pigs' eyes are similar to human eyes and were keen to explore this part of the anatomy to gain a better idea of how we see.

Gloves and safety goggles on and scissors and tweezers in hand, they began by locating the cornea which allows light to enter the eye, and the sclera which is the white of the eye. The keen-eyed among them spotted the optic nerve at the back of the eyeball which carries information to the brain. They then made their first incision and observed that a liquid called aqueous humour spilled out. This gives the eye its round shape and feeds it nutrients to keep it healthy.

The next part of the dissection was the most challenging - cutting into the sclera, which is very tough. However, they were rewarded for their persistence by finding the lens, which focuses light onto the retina and magnifies and sharpens the images we see, much like the job of a cinema projector. They placed the lens on top of some writing to prove that it does indeed do its job effectively.

Dissections like this are usually performed at senior school but the Year 6 pupils remained focused on the task and demonstrated their ability to handle practical lessons of this nature in a mature and sensible way. Well done all.- Mrs Sonn






Industrious Year Two.
