Snowdonia - Climbing Snowdon.



The boys and girls climbed Snowdon in the fastest time of any year group that has tackled the challenge. It was a little foggy at the top but as we descended the sun came out and we were treated to spectacular views. After dinner we headed down to the local lake, Lyn Padarn, for a jump in the water and a swim in the evening sunshine.



Snowdonia - Down the Mine We Go.



Adventures in the Rhiwbach Slate Mine in Cym Penmachno, exploring some of the tunnels worked in by Welsh miners of days gone by. We learnt that children as young as 8 or 9 worked in conditions of terrible hardship and danger in near dark conditions. As well as exploring tunnels and chambers, the boys and girls navigated their way through using climbing techniques such as Via ferrata and Tyrolian traverse.

Humanities.




For our recent topic on the Maya civilization, we were looking at evidence that tells us how the Maya used to live. We found objects that had been made from clay, with drawings and writing on them that gave us clues as to how they lived and what they believed. The drawings and writing were carved into clay. We decided to make our own clay pictures, telling things about our own lives and what life is like now. Some of us chose to illustrate the things we enjoy doing, whilst others chose to represent things that have harmed our environment, such as plastic rubbish waste in the sea or elephants being killed for their tusks. In this week's Outdoor Ed Club the children had to figure out the clues to find the hidden treasure. - Mrs Webster & Mrs Dakin




Nursery News.

The children have been working very hard in maths assessments at the start of their week.

We looked at Time, including ordering the months of the year and knowledge on which months belong to seasons. The children have also had a go at measuring time, using a stop watch to help decide which tasks might take seconds, minutes or hours to complete. They all had fun at trying out different tasks and timing each other.
