

What an exciting week in Nursery! Alongside all their other learning, our nursery children have been working so hard with their phonics lessons this year and it has really paid off. This week each nursery child has been given their first ever reading book to take home and share with their grownups. We are very proud of all our happy readers!

The children in Year One have all been working hard on split digraphs during their phonics lessons. These are taught within the phase 5 phonics in Year One. We have looked at the five different split digraphs that end in the letter 'e' and start with one of the five vowels. We have learnt the sound each one makes and looked at different words containing split digraphs to read, spotted them in our reading books, written them during our phonics lessons and practised them in our weekly spelling tests!



Penguins has been a continuing theme during our lessons in Year One this week. The children used cold coloured paints to set the tone, formulating the background for these fascinating creatures. The penguins were carefully crafted out of paper, snowflakes and glitter was added for full icy effect, the result some very cute creations! Chess Club

There are four hundred distinct chess positions after two moves (first move for White, followed by first move for Black). After three moves, there are 5,362 (after White's second move). As such, chess is a wonderfully complex game. Naturally, as we began our forays into learning and appreciating the game, we looked at opening strategies. Rather than memorising specific move combinations, our key focus was on general principles. Specifically, 'owning' the centre, developing powerful pieces and not leaving many pieces 'hanging' - undefended pieces.



As time continues, we will continue to focus on the centre, 'tempo' and thinking about the end game. Despite being quite new to the game, the boys have shown great aptitude and have been engaged with the process. They have particularly enjoyed seeing if they can beat various AI bots on <u>chess.com</u>, including 'Mittens' and the omniscient Stockfish which has an Elo rating of ~3400. If they manage to defeat the latter, Magnus Carlsen might be looking over his shoulder... - Mr Hunt
